Courtney: 01:21 I'm writing a fantasy that's a little maybe romance and lots of black magic.

Danielle:

O1:27 Yeah! \*Laughter\* Our book this week is Death Prefers Blondes by Caleb Roehrig. By Day Margo manning appears to be your average vapid socialite heiress, but by night she is the leader of a highly skilled group of drag wearing thieves, pulling off notorious heists and making hundreds of thousands of dollars. It's a perfect balance for Margo until a series of disasters causes her to lives to twined together and increasingly dangerous ways. Can, Margo keep herself and her friends safe from the threats that are high crime lifestyle has brought into their world? We'll see!

Danielle: 02:00 That's a great summary Amanda.

Amanda: 02:01 Thanks Danielle. I felt great about it.

Danielle: 02:04 Alright, so the elevator pitch for this book was that it is a heist novel about a group of teen drag Queens. Courtney, I know you had a lot of expectations going into this. What were you excited

for?

02:18 Well, I had actually read an article, on Book Riot about this upcoming release. So, I was excited to see the diversity in the characters as relates to drag culture. Specifically, Caleb made this comments, "it's challenged gender conformity, emphasizes femininity over masculinity and gleefully rebels in a lot of the stereotypes that queer phobic people have used to mock the LGBT community for generations." So, I was excited to see his play on that and the premise of the novel. How you Amanda?

I would've loved to see more of the ensemble this from it, but I think overall that it was really cool to have all of these different drag queen thieves with different backgrounds. He's like the most experienced drag queen of the lot. He's also the car man. We have Quino & Axel who are brothers and Quino is the acrobat and Axel is something.

Amanda: 05:07 What did Axel do?

Danielle: 05:08 I feel like he's just like a second, like a lieutenant.

Amanda: 05:12 Okay.



Danielle: 05:13 And then we have Leif who...

Amanda: 05:16 Is a ballerina.

Danielle: 05:17 Oh yeah, he's a dancer. We didn't really have a grifter. There was no grifting and at one point

it was lamp shaded that like Margo doesn't do grifting. I love that.

Amanda: 05:27 But we had all of our other tropes, like you've got your queue and your gadgets and..

Danielle: 05:32 Mastermind

Courtney: 05:32 Right.

Amanda: 05:32 Yeah.

And I also am a person of character driven storylines. So I was more interested in what the person was feeling as a result of that, or what they revealed about themselves in the fight less than the fight itself. So, if they were fighting, but what he revealed was, he was fighting, he was fighting against his anger or this person represented some characteristics. I would probably be more interested, but I couldn't take too much more of the fight scenes and the technical things or the screwdrivers or whatever they were talking about. \*Laughter\*

06:47 I really liked your thoughts and it made me think that what the world needs is like a hybrid graphic novel, like pros heist so that the graphic novel is the fight and the heist portions and the next chapter. They're all sitting around at coffee talking about what the heist meant to them and that'll be like pros.

way. I don't know. I mean, I know, I know that everybody says Six of Crows is like the best, highest

novel, but I have not read it so...

Danielle: 08:03 TBR, TBR. So, um, one thing about Leverage and also to go back to my NaNo, like another thing that Amanda and I talked a lot about when I was writing the heist novel is like what you share

with the readers and viewers and like what you keep secret so that there's still that element of

surprise for them. And I didn't feel like this book kept very much secret from us.

herself.

of the book for a couple reasons. One was that she said I'm not technically a drag queen and the other was like, she had this like barb situation with Valentina, where Valentina says something about like, "what about all your other fake parts", which seems like the kind of thing that like a terrible person would say to a transgender girl. So I thought that Margo was going to be trans and then when

she wasn't like, I was pretty disappointed.

You need it to be able to go somewhere and return back to the main plot. You have to be motivated and maybe that was the mechanism by which that motivation occurs. So, I'm not sure I liked that part of it, but I did love that when he described it, it sounded beautiful. It sounded fun. I really, truly. And maybe that's again that followup. It could have been his own thing. I mean Venice was its own thing really in the middle of the book.

Courtney: 20:42 So, what did you guys think about Margo and Dallas?

Amanda: 20:45 I liked it. I thought they were, uh, you know, I thought it was a good couple. I thought it was a good way to get Margo more behind the scenes information about the lawyer without adding

another character that didn't add a lot to the plot.

Danielle: 20:56 There was like the fake out where we were supposed to think that Dallas was betraying

Margo. What'd you think about that?

Courtney: 21:03 You know, I was tricked. This is where the heist element worked for me a little bit because

Amanda: 21:41 I know, I was like, oh, I like this random guy who's just dudein' long.

Danielle: 21:45 It is the hardest thing about us both reading the same books, like you know, she's like "Dallas

no!" And I have to be like poker face, which I don't have one of those.

Amanda: 21:56 She does not at all \*\*Laughter\*

Danielle: 21:56 So, usually I just have to leave the room.

Amanda: 22:02 I wanted to talk a little bit about Georgia, who was Devon's drag mom. I liked her presence

because a lot of people do develop very close relationships with their drag mothers and I think that was an important thing to show in the book. I did not like that they made her a drug addict. I felt like this book is pure escapism. Like it's like high absurdity, you know? I just didn't think it was necessary

to put in there. I feel like it Kinda slowed down the plot. I dunno wasn't for me. What did y'all think?

Danielle: 22:34 So, did it help that all that Georgia was like an adult? So, that teens can still identify with the

teens who provided escapism? It's not like a teen was a drug addict, It was removed from the teens

because it was an adult.

Amanda: 22:50 But most teens who are impacted by drugs in this way are not drug addicts themselves.

They're the children of drug addicts. There's an epidemic in this country...

Danielle: 22:58 Right.

Amanda: 22:59 ...of people dying of Opioid overdoses. So, for many kids it's not like they're friends on drugs.

That's their parents on drugs.

Danielle: 23:06 Right.



Amanda: 23:06 So, the opposite of that for them.

Danielle: 23:09 Yeah, I guess I can see that.

Courtney: 23:12 I was connected to Georgia as a character because it was more to me that I'm glad that

Davon, when he had his flaws, he found someone, so I think I just liked that even in this weakened state, she meant something to him and I liked her as a mechanism by which you can see how much, how caring the Davon was. So, I liked that part. I guess I didn't draw too much. Other than that. I

probably didn't connect as much to the drug addiction portion of the story.

Amanda: 23:39 I just felt like it wasn't necessary because it was erased so quickly, was just like she went to

rehab and then she's better and decided to be better, which is I don't think it's fair

Courtney: 23:51 This is not reality, not the 31 years of addiction or however long.

Danielle: 23:54 Yeah, and I think this would have been a good opportunity. Not to like rewrite the book again,

but like this would have been a good opportunity instead of having Georgia there at all just to have Davon with his super supportive parents and have him be doing crime for crime sake to like test out

his tech genius and his car genius and all of his geniuses.

Courtney: 24:17 Yeah.

Amanda: 24:17 And maybe having having Leif have this very supportive drag mother because he had such

unsupportive parents.

Danielle: 24:24 Oooo!

Amanda: 24:24 Just changing the whole thing. \*Laughter\*



24:27 So, I really liked Davon's character. So, from my perspective sometimes in the black community, in the black community, a lack of acceptance of LGBT, anything. And a lot of times you see toxic masculinity in black community where black kids, I have a really tough time as in any kid would and coming out. So I liked the idea of them showing a black father and a black mother being supportive of their son in his endeavors and then enabling him to be able to fight against those people who would not love him the same way they will. I thought that was really good, and so for that reason I would have loved to see those parents persist in the story-line.

Danielle: 25:11 Yes.

Courtney: 25:11 That was my thought on that. I really liked his parents. I just love the role that they played in. I'm glad that that wasn't a weakness that he had as a character in him that having supportive parents.

Danielle: 25:21 Yeah.

Amanda: 25:22 Agreed. So overall we thought that this was a fun read that maybe dragged on a little bit in some places..
