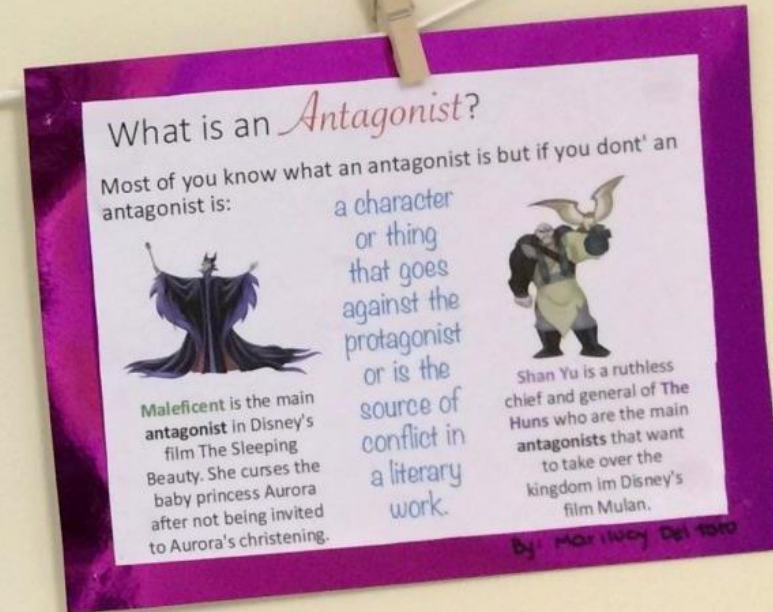

Poetic Devices

Litote	An understatement, often used ironically
Metaphor	A direct comparison of two unlike things
Mood	The prevailing feeling or atmosphere of a poem
Onomatopoeia	The use of words which sound like what they mean
Paradox	A statement that seems contradictory, but is actually true
Personification	Giving an object human-like qualities
Repetition	Using the same word or phrase more than once for emphasis
Rhyme	The use of words that sound alike
